# THE PRIMARIES

Held in the Various Precincts of Ogden.

## GOOD MEN ARE CHOSEN

Unanimity and Harmony Prevalled.

## THE COUNTY CONVENTION

Will Consist. of Nearly One Hundred Delegates.

### "STAND STANCHE BY THE GRAND OLD PARTY"

Such Was the Motto—The Liberal Movement Receives a Scoring—Several Outlying Precincts Have Reported Delegates.

Primaries of the Republican party to elect delegates to the County convention to be held in the County court house, July 17th, at 2 p. m. were held in all the precincts of the County last evening.

In Ogden the meetings were enthusiastic and boded well for the success of the Republican party. Strong speeches were made in favor of the movement to divide on National issues and the fact that the liberal element allowed itself to be whipped in-to line by the Tribune received condemnation.

The results of the meeting are given as follows:

#### FIRST PRECINCT.

The primary of the first precinct was held in the federal court room.

Sidney Stevens was elected chairman and W. T. Beardsley secretary.

The object of the meeting was stated by the chair and nominations were at once made. The voting was done by acclamation and the following delegates elected:

#### SECOND PRECINCT.

The second precinct primary was held in the federal court room.

C. H. McClure was elected chairman and A. R. Heywood, secretary.

The voting was done by acclamation, with the following results: M. N. Graves, J. E. Coolidge, J. S. Painter, A. R. Heywood, C. H. McClure, H. H. Thomas, O. O. Howard, Jr., Jas. Beeston, Sol. Gaunter, Jas. G. Moyes. No alternates were elected.

#### THIRD PRECINCT.

The primary in the third precinct was held in the Mound Fort rock schoolhouse. The following delegates were elected:

C. A. Barrows, Ben E. Rich, Levi Billings, J. E. Bagley, M. J. Stone, A. I. Stone. Alternates: W. S. Harris, David Farr, T. W. Stewart.

#### FOURTH PRECINCT.

The primary of the Fourth Ward was held in the Amusement Hall.

L. R. Rogers was elected chairman and John V. Bluth, secretary of the meeting.

John L. Wallace and Joseph Belnap were appointed tellers.

On motion it was decided to vote by ballot, the ten parties receiving the highest number of votes to be declared elected.

The chair endorsed remarks made by previous speakers on the necessity of electing good men.

Balloting began and resulted in the election of the following delegates: L. R. Rogers, E. M. Allison, Jr., A. T. Wright, J. V. Bluth, E. Stratford, W. R. White, H. E. Steele, I. L. Clark, N. C. Flygare, A. J. Bailey. For alternates, J. D. Fife, J. L. Wallace, J. D. Murphy and C. E. Peterson.

Speeches were made advising union and persevering work not only to defeat the Democrats but any other party pitched against the Grand old party. Mr. Allison, among other things stated that he gladly embraced the opportunity of praising Abraham Lincoln in place of abusing Brigham Young. The leaders of the liberal party in both Salt Lake and Ogden were Democrats and efforts made in behalf of the liberal party were a decided effort in favor of the Democratic party.

#### FIFTH PRECINCT.

The primary of the fifth precinct was held last night in the Fifth Ward Institute.

The meeting was called to order by Gen. R. H. G. Minty and on motion of F. B. Hurlbut, Gen. Minty was nominated chairman and G. H. Durbrow, secretary.

On motion nominations were declared in order, and the election of ten delegates proceeded with.

The following delegates were elected:

#### MARRIOTT'S PRECINCT.

The delegates elected in Marriotts were Timothy Terry and Heber Salisbury.

The Republicans organized a club at the same time. To use the correspondents words, they "have an eternal work over. There are not half a dozen Democrats in the whole precinct."

#### LIBERTY PRECINCT.

Word reached this City late last night that Liberty had elected delegates, though the names could not be secured. A club was also organized, fifteen out of twenty-eight registered voters signing the roll. Good for Lib-
