## Treasury Report for April.

Washington, April 30.—The treasury receipts during the month ended today have not met the expectations of the officials, and the indications now are that the deficit at the end of the fiscal year will be little, if any, less than \$45,000,000.

The receipts for the month of April amount to \$24,248,836, and the expenditures to \$32,952,690, leaving a deficit for the month of \$8,704,854, and for the fiscal year to date \$45,247,006.

The receipts from internal revenue show a falling off for April as compared with the same month in 1894 of more than \$700,000 and a falling off for the ten months of the fiscal year of about \$2,000,000. During the remaining two months of the fiscal year there will be no extraordinary expenditures. The pension payments will amount to about \$22,000,000 and \$1,250,000 will be repaid on interest account. The net result of the year is not expected to differ very materially from today's figures, and yet in making this estimate a considerable revenue from the income tax is antici-
