Belt ordaines by the Mayor and City Council of Ogden City: SECTION 1. The appointive officers of his city shall be a city engineer, poll

tax collector, city sexton, chief of police, chief engineer of the fire department, and pound keeper. SEC. 2. The mayor shall, by and with the advice and consent of the city council appoint on or before the first Monday
