

ALL HAIL TO THE BOYS

Who Will Wear the Blue and Fight
For You.

TURN OUT IN HONOR

Of the Volunteers, Who Today Depart for
Fort Douglas and Enter Upon Their
Duties As Defenders of the Stars and
Stripes.

At 2:10 o'clock this afternoon, the volunteers who have enlisted for the war with Spain, and who according to the orders of the war department are to go to the Philippine Islands when Commodore Dewey has planted the Stars and Stripes, will depart for their first camp at Fort Douglas, where they will be mustered into the United States army and begin drilling for active duty. Of the total number enlisted the following only were allowed to be mustered into the army, as the number enlisted in the state is over 700 and the call of President McKinley was but for 425, including officers, being but 385 privates. The number from Ogden therefore is but 28, as follows:

The cavalry men accepted are: Thomas Dorsey, Posey B. Florence and Augustus Branson, and per telegraphic instructions from Gov. Wells pursuant to orders from the war department, they will not be mustered in until further orders. They will therefore not go down to Salt Lake today. This would indicate that only the artillery and mounted riflemen were to be sent to the Philippines at once.

The spirit of patriotism is proving itself even stronger than in 1776 or 1861, and every effort is being made to properly demonstrate the appreciation of the actions of the volunteers, by the people of Ogden, and today will be a day of patriotism and exhibition of pride in the youths who go in battle for the starry old flag—"Old Glory," whose colors shine more brightly than they did at any time in the past.

Last night Mayor Boyle, Chief Davenport and a number of citizens met at the mayor's office in the City Hall and formulated a program which will be carried out as nearly as possible as follows:
