Apostle Clawson Delivers Sermons At Stake Conference

Eloquent discourses on gospel sub-jects were delivered at the local tab-ernacle at Ogden stake quarterly conference Sunday by Apostle Rud-ger Clawson, president of the quor-um of the twelve apostles of the L. D. S. church.






