

# YANKEE PLANS AERIAL TRAM

## New Development Will Enable Increasing Shipments to 100 Tons Daily

Increased ore shipments at the Yankee mine in American Fork canyon will be possible with the completion of an aerial tramway, A. H. Means, manager of the western mining department of the American Smelting and Refining company, operators of the American Fork property, announced Friday.

The new tramway is being constructed at a cost of approximately \$80,000 and will be completed within three or four months. At the present time the mine is shipping 50 tons daily, but this can be doubled when the tramway is finished, Mr. Means said.

Under the present haulage system the output is taken by wagon down the canyon, a distance of six miles. At the Deer Creek station it is trucked to the railroad loading station at Pleasant Grove. The tramway will eliminate the six-mile wagon haul, and through the lowering of costs enable the mine to ship lower grade ores at profit.

Present ore is coming from a body opened up for a length of 800 feet. The body is 200 feet wide and 50 feet thick at the point of maximum dimension. It shows average values of from \$8 to \$14 in gold, 3 to 5 ounces silver, and 2 to 4 per cent copper.

Ore is in a heavy sulphide, occurring in a flat bedding of the Kennebec shale, and is a replacement of the limestone. An 1800-foot drainage and transportation has been used in the development, raises and cross-cuts being driven into the ore.

The American Smelting and Refining company owns the majority of the Yankee Mines stock. The smelting company took control over a year ago. Holdings are approximately 400 acres of mineral lands, including the old Live Yankee, Silver Wave, Belleophon and Power Fractions properties.

Company officers and directors are: R. M. Means, president; A. E. Ring, vice president; L. K. Nicholson, treasurer; P. H. Poulton, secretary; E. M. Bagley, R. L. Judd and W. O'Connor, additional directors.

Reports that Yankee had made a recent gold strike were denied Friday night by Mr. Means.

Such reports are entirely erroneous, Mr. Means said. The fact that is now being taken out is coming from ground which has been in production for the past six months, and conditions are practically the same at the mine as they were at that time.

The significance of the announcement is that we can increase our output from our present ore body and also ship lower grade ore at a profit by cutting down operating expenses.

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# Eric Smith Wins Title In Amateur

## Young Cambridge Student Defeats DeForest in Final Match.

WESTWARD HO, DEVON, England, May 22 (AP)—Eric Martin Smith, 22-year-old Cambridge university student who entered the British amateur golf championship just for fun, remained to succeed Bobby Jones as the titleholder.

Smith today defeated John DeForest, son of a Fleet baron and a fellow member of the Bachelors club, by one hole in the final 36-hole match. His medal score was a round 89 for each round.

The upsets and surprises of the 1931 tournament which saw George Colvill beaten by Syd Roper, and Cyril Tolley and Roger Wethered former champions, put out of the tournament in the fifth round, carried right on through to the final.

DeForest was the favorite to take the title, but Smith led him through a 20-hole singles match which was squared several times in the last time as late as the 34th hole.
